¹UNCF enlisted Hart Research Associates to conduct a survey that resulted in 631 survey responses from African American community leaders who live in cities with populations of at least 250,000 and had high densities of African Americans in the summer of 2013. Respondents included non-profit leaders, clergy, business, higher education and political leaders. Additionally, Hart Associates conducted in-depth phone interviews with 36 African American leaders across the country in 2014.
